His work has exposed major gaps within both legislation and court process that significantly predispose people who suffer mental illness, intellectual disability or an acquired brain injury to unjust outcomes. At present, he is writing a definitive legal text on the subject which will be published later this year.

Sharon Boyce works part-time in early childhood and inclusive teacher education at the University of Southern Queensland and also with students across Toowoomba and the Darling Downs, who have learning difficulties. Sharon is also doing her PhD at UQ. Sharon, together with Dr Michael Furtado, runs an educational consultancy Discovering DisAbility & Diversity, which has as its major focus the promotion of inclusive practices for educators across many diverse backgrounds. They design and deliver training in a variety of educational settings from early childhood centres, preschools, primary and secondary schools, industry and universities to individual private clients with particular needs. Their mission is to encourage, motivate and help people celebrate diversity and practice equity in all things.

Sharon Boyce has lived in Toowoomba all her life. She lives most of her life in an electric wheelchair, as she contracted Rheumatoid Arthritis when she was 11 years old. She has used the wheelchair for the past 20 years.

Sharon has not allowed her disability to stop her from doing what she wants. She works on a radio show reviewing movies and loves swimming at least twice a week. She loves painting and exhibiting her acrylic abstracts and is a curated artist. She has written and published an educational resource folder called *A Day in the Life of Sharon Boyce*—*A person with a physical disability* and will have the second resource folder *Another Day in the Life of Sharon Boyce*—*A person with a physical disability* launched tonight. She has written a children's adventure story dealing with discovery and disability. She is currently completing her book on

Dyslexia and reading difficulties. She won the Queensland Disability Action Week Award in 2003 for this and her work with children. Sharon also recently won the Human Rights Award for Individuals (2008), for her work with community in disability and diversity awareness and for promoting inclusion across Australia.
